"Duck"

We will glide more easily through troubled waters, because we will surely hit troubled waters, using palmate (yes, I looked it up - the plural of "palmate" is "palmate;" now I have to ask the individual who coined this odd word - was it so difficult to add an "s" to the end?) designed to get us to where He wants us to go. We will glide more easily through the troubles of life born of the Spirit.
